



DIRECTOR'S CABIN: Strategically spotted to be near most camp activities — day or night.

Sparrow Lake Camp

occupies 250 acres of well-wooded land, with a sandy bathing beach that is unique, located on Sparrow Lake, 7 miles from Washago. Although owned and operated by The United Church of Canada, the Camp is self-sustaining. No church funds are used for its operations, maintenance or improvements.

Low-cost vacations, under church supervision, are made available to boys and girls from churches in the Toronto and York Presbyteries.

CAMPERS' CABINS: There are 13 large cabins (18' by 27') each fitted with twelve bunks.

RECREATION HALL. At the lakeside, close by the wonderful sandy beach, is this fine Recreation Hall, 90' long by 50' wide, for recreation, play parties, basketball, concerts, etc. . . . Stage is 28' wide by 15' deep. This popular building is used for evening programs or rainy-day activities.



Only a fraction of the land has been cleared — leaving ample forest space for hikes, nature study, woodcraft groups, shore breakfasts and suppers, etc.

Bunks and mattresses are supplied — but campers must bring own sheets, blankets, pillows, towels, etc.

The Camp Superintendent, Resident Business Manager and Camp Nurse pay particular attention to the accommodation, meals and health of the campers.

Most of the campers travel by train in a group from Toronto to Washago on the main line of the C.N.R. — thence by bus along the paved road around the Lake to the camp. This enables the campers to get acquainted en route — and special rates (covering train, bus, and baggage transfer) are available through the Camp Office.

More and more United Church parents are becoming interested in Sparrow Lake Camp each year for their boys and girls of camping age — and are delighted with how much it gives for so little through lowest possible fees.
